



Notes from the Editor – Barry Elsey

Like other club members, I happily engage with the various activities and appreciate the collective voluntary effort required to keep things running actively and smoothly. A bonus for me is to sometimes connect with a 'big picture' of previous social and cultural studies that places the NACC in a wider context. Altogether they underline the importance of the role and purpose of the club in sustaining local community life and Australian society generally. You might like to see your club membership in another light through the observations of academic research and commentary. More to follow.

Regular playing and easy-going banter with other club members is a pleasant way to use leisure in an active and enjoyable way. We often hear laughter from groups making their way around the croquet courts, which continues over coffee and announcements at the intervals. There are few sports with such capacity for mutual entertainment in our struggles to play well. Clearly, we love the game of croquet, the club and what it offers for quality recreation and social interaction. Does it mean more than that?

What would the Mongolians think?

Such experiences remind me of encounters with people from other countries not as fortunate in having such a relaxed lifestyle. Years ago, I met with a group from Mongolia sent by their government to visit Australian social welfare services. My brief was to discuss social philosophies underpinning government and private sector provision. They were attracted to my explanation that the idea of well-being acted like an invisible hand in supporting and extending state-sponsored welfare. My point was that through voluntary associations, like the NACC, people have the freedom to meet and pursue leisure and recreation activities that provide simple pleasure shared in the company of others. Such lived experience by a mysterious alchemy fosters our collective resilience and individual immune systems. For those mainly familiar with top-down government this perspective was mind stretching. I like to think that the Mongolians returned home with ideas that were long forbidden in their dour political system.

Another observation about the NACC, and most voluntary associations, is as a meeting place for the promotion and sustainability of friendship. I think we do friendship very well as a club. The club fosters every kind of friendship and provides an easy starting point for forming new ones. Through friendships of all kinds mutual support is given freely. We have all done our bit to ask after the well-being of other members and much more besides, all freely given in the name of everyday friendliness and simple care for others. This is a wider meaning of voluntary association.

Even the German philosopher Friedrich Nietzche, not usually recognised for earthly observation, noted that "*It is fellowship in joy, not in sympathy in sorrow, that makes people friends*". So, keep up the banter and easy laughter!

Nietzche's observation takes us back to the 'life be in it' active lifestyle movement of the 1980s, capturing the essence of club membership and the pleasures of playing games and pursuing informal education (including the Scrabble players, the U3A and other groups that use the spacious club facilities with their own doings). Taken together these activities comprise local support networks that we all need to provide quality and sustenance to our lives. Long may our activities thrive.

Recipient of Prospect Council Community Service Award



All 2021 recipients of Prospect Council Community Service Awards

The NACC History Aspect. - Gayle Searle

Historical information of the North Adelaide Croquet Club is an important part of us all appreciating how we came to be the Club we are today. As many of you know, I have been collecting photos and memorabilia from the old croquet clubrooms and displaying them in our current clubrooms. Photo albums that were previously stored away on a shelf are on display for people to look through and enjoy. I have also been developing a history page on our new website where you can see more details of events that have occurred since 1926 when the Prospect Club was first formed, 95 years ago! In 2026 (only 5yrs away) we will be celebrating 100 years!



I had a chat with one of our long- standing members, Kay Seeary, who has been a member of this Croquet Club through its significant changes over many years. She kindly wrote out a few words for me to add into the newsletter, which I have added below.

"Prospect Croquet Club was inaugurated in March 1926 with 33 foundation members, many of

whom were wives of bowlers from the Prospect Bowling Club. The foundation President was Mrs F.W. Hudd who gave valuable service to the Prospect and SACA, holding office for 41 years. (Mrs Hudd's photo is in the office of our current clubrooms)

Prospect Croquet Club for many years had only one lawn next to the Prospect Bowling Club. The men played bowls and the women played croquet. On Saturdays, the women would also prepare and serve the men afternoon tea! One lawn was often divided in half to accommodate 16 players at a time. If there were more than 16 players, then cards were played by the others whilst they waited for afternoon tea and then the second game began.

One of the significant changes was the women changing from side style (to accommodate skirts) to centre style when it was more acceptable for women to wear slacks. The Prospect players were very competitive and were active in the administration of the sport.

In 2000 the Prospect Bowling Club amalgamated with Broadview Club which left the marvellous premises vacant. We quickly applied to the Prospect Council for the use of the premises and to that end we needed more members. Fitzroy & Broadview Clubs were invited to join us. Broadview declined but Fitzroy accepted. The Council approved so the new club "North Adelaide Croquet Club" was born.

At that stage we had fifty to sixty members mostly playing "Association Croquet (AC)". We now have approximately eighty members mostly playing "Golf Croquet (GC)" and approximately twenty AC players.

Golf Croquet was introduced as an introductory game that has now become a game with its own rules.

The club members are enthusiastic both with competitions and social activities enhancing the ongoing success of the North Adelaide Croquet Club today."

I am sure there are many more tales to tell from other members of the Club so hopefully I can feature some more in the future editions. Please have a look around the Club and take a little time to check out the photos and mallets and medals from our past and present players' achievements.
