It is an important aspect of club culture. **Social croquet** is mainly for pleasure and recreation and keeps the club in balance with itself.

Another feature, which started with consulting members about Covid vaccination policy and the presence of dogs on club days, is to strive to encourage the members to have a say about how the club is managed and the direction it takes. A significant opportunity will exist soon, probably in later May, to engage in a Sunday afternoon **strategic planning** exercise. As a club we need to think about the future and address issues that will continue to demand attention, such as member recruitment, maintaining financial sustainability, the role of voluntary effort in regular maintenance, governance, and other matters. We should also consider what makes the club 'tick' and how that can best be expressed as a vision, values, and purpose statement. We will communicate with all members about the workshop after Easter.

In the rest of the newsletter, we report on competition events in AC and GC, together with other items. In the next edition we shall highlight the **gala day** event scheduled for late April. Undoubtedly, it will be a fine example of club members pulling together to organise and manage an event which does so much to promote the admiration of croquet players elsewhere.



stories formed the background to Patrick, with his keen croquet

playing, which he combined with an old-world, polite mannered charm, complete with straw hat and rounded off with a bottle of brown ale. Patrick could be relied upon to bring several

friends to wine downs and actively supporting the club in other ways.

Patrick belonged to a disappearing generation of men and women who passed through years of economic depression, wartime dangers, post-war austerity, and eventual reconstruction of very damaged societies. The courage, resilience, and sense of duty of millions like Patrick built the foundations of fairer, socially just and more equal as well as affluent societies, such as Australia and the UK.
